At the Breconshire Quarter Sessions, on Tuesday, *Sir Joseph Bailey* presented an excellent portrait in oil of the late Lord Tredegar to the magistracy of the county, to be hung up in the grand jury room. The chairman (Rev. Hugh Bold), one of the oldest friends of the deceased nobleman, accepted the memorial in racsful terms on behalf of the magistrates. u—*—...

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The Late Lord Tredegar

Sir Joseph Bailey rose and said he had to ask their permission to introduce a mater which was not on the agenda. It was a special matter and one that he was anxious to bring before the magistrates. At the time of the death of the late Lord Tredegar it was felt by a great many persons in the county that the county ought to possess some suitable memorial to one who had been connected to the county for many years and was a personal of all in it. A committee was formed for that purpose and after a good deal of deliberation they thought that the most suitable memorial of the late Lord Tredegar would be that his face could better perpetuated by a picture in that room, so toned and painted that after his features were forgotten - which of course happened in the course of a generation after the death of every man - they should have a picture which should be not only a suitable work of art, but also a true likeness of the late nobleman (Hear hear). He attended today to present that picture (that was standing in a case against the wall) to the magistrates of the county of Brecon, and he trusted they would do him the favour of accepting it and hanging it on the walls of that room (applause). The artist he might add was a gentleman of some note, whose skilled hand was very well known. Considering the circumstances under which the picture was painted - after the death of Lord Tredegar - he thought the picture was a most remarkable likeness (hear hear) . He thought it would commend itself to almost everyone who saw it . His duty was now to present that picture , if they would kindly accept it (applause).

The Chairman said he was very sure he would be speaking for every magistrate in the county when he 5thanked sir Joseph Bailey for the picture which he had presented to them (hear ,hear) The late Lord Tredegar was one of their oldest friends and he (the chairman) was sorry they had lost him. He was sure they all sincerely thanked Sir Joseph Bailey and would be glad to have the picture hung in that room (hear ,hear) . Sir Joseph Bailey replying to the Rev L. Venables said that the artist was Mr William Gale .
