

## UNIVERSITY INTELLIGENCE.

(FROM OUR CORRESPONDENT.)

CAMBRIDGE, JAN. 10.

The Rev. Dr. Swainson, Master of Christ's College, to-day formally resigned the office of Vice-Chancellor, which he has held for the past two years, and Dr. Taylor, Master of St. John's, was inducted in succession. The retiring Vice-Chancellor, in some valedictory remarks, reviewed the matters of interest to the University which had occurred during his past year of office, alluding to the success of the local examinations, which, he said, formed annually thousands of fresh links uniting the union with various classes through the country. Dr. Swainson feelingly referred to the loss the University had sustained by the deaths of Dr. Bradshaw, late University librarian, and Dr. Thomson, late Master of Trinity. He welcomed the proposal of the Attorney General to devote the interest of 10,000*l.* to the establishment of a studentship in pathology, and proceeded to say that within the last few days he had received legal intimation that the late **Mrs.** Clerk Maxwell had made the University a bequest of about 10,000*l.* for the purpose of founding a scholarship or studentship in those branches of physical science with which the memory of her husband would have been otherwise long associated. While gratefully acknowledging these benefactions, however, the University needed that it should be proclaimed throughout the length and breadth of England that instead of being a wealthy body, it was hampered on every side for the want of funds. They required money for the library, to build museums, for laboratories, lecture rooms, and examination halls. He conceived that they wanted at least 100,000*l.* to carry on their work. At the conclusion of Dr. Swainson's address Dr. Taylor was formally admitted to office.
