JOHN COGAN, (b. ,d.1657.) Benefactor to the City By will dated July 27, 1657, he gave in trust his house in St. Peter's and lands and tenements in St. Mildred's and Thanington, for the benefit of six poor widows of ministers; £15 annually to three maidservants; clothing for six girls and keeping the house repaired. The records of the City state that "in 1657 he founded a hospital for the widows of clergymen in St. Peter's in the city, adjoining to Cockyn's hospital, and that in 1696 this was further endowed by Dr. Aucher."

OIL PAINTING—42½ in. high x 36½ in. wide, not dated. Artist: CORNELLIS JANSSENS VAN CEULEN. Carved wood frame 3½ in. wide, painted brown, and with gilt bevel.

Half-length portrait, standing, white Puritan collar, white cuffs, brown coat, long curly grey hair, one arm resting on a chair, one hand resting on a frame with an inscription of his name and the nature of his benefactions, a background of trees and sky, with a column and red curtain.

Framed in 1708 together with Robinson's portrait at a cost of 30s.? (Brent).

Walpole, "Anecdotes of Painting," &c., observes that "Between the years 1630 and 1640, Jansen lived much in Kent at a small village called Bridge, near Barham Downs, and drew many portraits for gentlemen in the neighbourhood, particularly of the families of Auger, Palmer, Hammond and Bowyer." On this passage, Dellaway notes: "In 1636 and the next following years, Cornelius Jansen resided with Sir Arnold Braems, a Flemish merchant, at Bridge, near Canterbury. St. Alban's Court, the

residence of the Hammond family, still retain remarkable examples of his genuine and best style." &c. This long connexion of Janssens with the neigbourhood of Canterbury, strangely confirms the correctness of the attribution of this portrait to him.

No. II

Wm. BALDOCK, (b. , d. ,) of Petham, Kent-Built the King's Barracks at Canterbury.

In 1798—9 permanent infantry barracks, for upwards of 2,000 privates, with accommodation for a suitable number of officers, were built, at the expense of Wm. Baldock and Thos. De Lasaux, adjoining the cavalry barracks, in Northgate.

OIL PAINTING—50 in. high x 40 in. wide, not dated.

Artist: T. DINSDALE. Gilded frame 3\frac{1}{4} in. wide.

Three-quarter length portrait, seated, black coat, white neckcloth, white vest, grey breeches buckled at the knee, one hand resting on the arm of his chair, the other holding a letter with his name and address on, green table-cloth, a map or plan with red seal, and an inkstand and pen, spectacles, etc.; background of column and red curtain, with trees and sky.

No. 12.

ALDERMAN BARHAM, (b. 1702, d. 1784,) the grandfather of Richard Harris Barham (b. 1788, d. 1845,) the author of "Ingoldsby Legends."

In 1719 Harris's Almshouses, Wincheap, were founded and endowed, and Alderman Barham is referred to as being a trustee.

William Baldock, together with Thomas De Lasaux, paid for the building of permanent infantry barracks for upwards of 2,000 men and also accommodation for officers, adjoining the cavalry barracks, Northgate, in 1798 - 99.

Stephen Rumbold Lushington (1776 - 1868) was M.P. for Canterbury from 1812 - 1830 and from 1835 - 1837. He was made Privy Councillor in 1827, and was Governor of Madras in 1827 - 1835.
